WHAT'S A PASTOR?

What's a Pastor? What's Pastoral Concern? I suppose that there are several sorts of answers to those questions. But what about here at Seminary: do we have them here?

Hundreds of students who have, in one way or another, made their way through student reaction to the Joint Administhis Seminary in the past fourteen years know all about it. There are some of us here now who know very well that we have both a Pastor and pastoral concern at Gettyshurg. These concepts are perhaps best personified in one man: Francis E. Reinberger.

Strange. . . . for many that "Doctor" in front of Reinberger comes very hard. "Pastor" comes so much more naturally. Is that significant? I think so. There are scores of students, present and past, who can testify to the ability of our "Seminary Pastor" to be in the right place student at Gettysburg Junior High School, at the right time. Many things come to mind: the death of a seminarian's wife, marriage problems, growing pains of faith and a whole host of other things.

During the past years, Pastor Reinberger has been one of the greatest influences for good on the lives of seminarians here at Gettysburg. We have been fortunate to have had such a man in our midst. And it's too had that not all of the students currently here have had the opportunity to come under his subtle and genuinely interested influence.

Pastor Reinberger's resignation signals a great loss to our Seminary community, as well as to the community of Gettysburg, of which he has been an active part. And especially so when those two communities are so separate from one another, more often than not. But most important, we here on "the hill" are loosing a valued professor, pastor and friend.
