## A REACTION TO THE COLLOQUY ON CONFIRMATION

A few months ago, I sat amazed, shocked, startled and bewildered in a Junior Seminar Practicum after Mr. Hale mentioned that some congregations were experimenting with giving Holy Communion prior to confirmation. Now, after attending the Colloguy on Confirmation, I am exuberant at the thought that by removing admission to the Lord's Supper as a club with which we force young people at attend confirmation classes or a carrot we dangle before young people as a means of enticing them to seek to be confirmed, confirmation may be realized as an intrinsicly meaningful rite and process for the whole Christian Community.

I am extremely happy that the Joint Commission on the Theology and Practice of Confirmation has defined confirmation 'as a pastoral and educational ministry of the church that is designed to help baptized children identify with the life and mission of the adult Christian community and that is celebrated in a public rite." I am especially happy that the definition has inherent in it an understanding of confirmation as a puberty rite which may be a means of grace.

Granted that a rite within the Church is not going to solve all the problems adolescents face, it is at least refreshing to pender its implications for the young people who are confirmed and the congregations who "recognize the confirmand as capable of identifing with the life and mission of the adult Christian Community." Education.) At least, the church will be supplying one place in our society where young people can say, "Yesterday, I was a child, today I am a man."

Obviously, the rite will be useless if the confirmands! role within the church remains the same after confirmation as it was prior to it, but if they are given an active role in adopting the life and mission of the church to the present time, both the parish and the confirmands stand to profit immensely.

#### MERGE - A NEW SEMINARY

The questionaires concerning seminary merger with Mt. Airy have been tabulated. What follows is a brief summary of the results. 70% were returned making the survey a valid indicator of student opinion. (74 from the juniors, 62% from the middlers and 72% from both the interns and seniors.)

Concerning merger, 46% said YES while 54% said NO.

If a new merged seminary results:

Location in order of preference:
Gettysburg
Washington, D.C.
Baltimore
Philadelphia

(perhaps too few students knew about possibilities with St. Mary's.)

Proximity to a university:

very important 11%

somewhat important 50%

not important 39%

Co-location with other seminaries:

very important 34 %

somewhat important 46 %

not important 20 %

Co-location with Roman Catholic seminary: very important 30%

somewhat important 46% not important 14%

Location in the inner-city:

very important 8%, somewhat important 40% not important 53%.

A clear majority of the students thank that a seminary cluster including protestants and Roman Catholics located near a university is important. Location in the inner-city is rejected by more than 50%. It might be helpful if the JC and the AATS stated specifically what they mean by the inner-city.

Should the faculty live on or near the campus:

very desirable 69%
somewhat desirable 23%
not necessarily des. 9%

# Married student apartments: how many should the seminary provide? (their own opinion)

all 17% majority 65% none 17% 17%

Location of married student apartments on campus:

very important 61% somewhat important 27% not important 12%

Single student dorms: how many should the seminary provide? (their own opinion)

all 47% 38% some 13% none 2%

Location of single student dorms on campus:

very important 67%, somewhat important 23%, not important 10%,

Both married and single students think that a majority of their living facilities should be provided on campus by the seminary.
