STUDENT ASSOCIATION MINUEES April 6, 1971

The fifth meeting of the Student Association for the academic year 1970-71 was called to order by the president, Bill Scholl.

Nominations for the offices of Student Association president and treasurer were entertained from the floor, Randy Neubauer and Dwane Michael had previously petitioned to be candidates for president and treasurer, pespectively. The floor nominated, in addition, William Stickley for president and Alan Wenrich for treasurer. The elections will be held in the coffee shop on Tuesday, April 20.

It was decided that a proposal raising the annual Student Association dues from the present \$9 per student to \$12 per student will also be placed on the ballot.

The Ecumenics Committee proposed that 50% rebates would be granted to those students who drove to the Weshington weekend. This would constitute a total of \$59.25. It was also proposed that some funds be earmarked to sponsor a walker or walkers in the CROP 10-mble walk scheduled for April 25. Bill Scholl assured the committee that they are empowered to use committee funds in any way they see fit. He also urged participation in the CROP drive, both as sponsors and as wolkers.
