"I, the unkind, ungrateful? Ah, my dear, I cannot look on thee."


Love took my hand, and smiling did reply, "Who made the eyes but I?"

Coincidental with the opening of the Folkemer Family Store was an archeological find of great significance. A manuscript of ancient potions was discovered beneath the statue of Martin Luther. For your edification, and experimentation, we reproduce herewith one of the many formulae found in the text.
