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I CHALLENGE YOU

The front page of each of the first three editions of "Table Talk" has been occupied by a portion of a "mult-part editorial" which has concerned itself with "...the various aspects of religious education..." here at Gettysburg. In these articles, Bob Dealey attempted to provide a brief summary of the academic situation at this institution while at the same time pointing out some of its short comings.

A committee is now functioning with the goal of producing a new curriculum. The seminary realizes that the present system is inadequate and that it is in need of revision. I view this attitude with a certain amount of skepticism. Was it not just three or four years ago that the present curriculum appeared as a revision of the old? And, does not Gettysburg have a history of curriculum changes? I praise the seminary for its desire to obtain an adequate curriculum and I marvel at its inability to produce one.

I am, therefore, writing this article as a personal challenge to the Curriculum Revision Committee.

I CHALLENGE YOU to produce a revision of the seminary curriculum which does what it is suppose to do: to prepare men and women as effective leaders in God's church on earth.

I CHALLENGE YOU to produce a revision of the seminary curriculum which looks beyond the immediate situation to the future. In the past, curricula have been designed with the smoothness and ease of operation in mind rather than the product which results from it. Which is more important: the ease by which a curriculum is implemented and run or the quality of leadership which it produces?

I CHALLENGE YOU to produce a revision of the seminary curriculum which is aimed at the preparation of leaders who know the true gospel and who are able and willing to take a stand against the gospel which has been corrupted by the world and man's own self-interest.

The church today is caught in a vicious cycle. Due to a need in the past for a large number of clergy, the church ordained persons who were unsure of the content of the gospel, uncertain of the role of the church, and unaffected by the demands of the gospel. The church has produced leaders who are more willing to follow the way of men that to stand against them in the way of the Lord. These people then produce similar followers who go to seminary to become "ministers." The seminary has aided this process by revising its curriculum again and again in order that it might eliminate any conflict—conflict between the way of men and the way of the Lord.

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I CHALLENGE YOU (the Curriculum Revision Committee) to produce a revision of the seminary curriculum which breaks this cycle by producing leaders who are willing and strong enough to stand in the way of the Lord even when it stands against the way of man.
