What are the facts? Every minute an estimated 70 people die of starvation and malnutrition, or anout 35 million people a year. On the other hand, we should review our situation as a society whose diet is largely meat that one poun of a proper grain mixture would supply us with as much protoin as 20 pounds fed to cattle and which is eaten as beef (statistice from "Our vorld is Hungry " by Jobert J. Harshall: The Lutheran, November 6, 1974, vol. 12, No. 19, p. 4-8).

To brins this closer to home, we have witnessed an evident lack of continuine comnunity action. We have not changed our diet nor our life-style in response to this world need. Cur action should be nore then a "one-shot" attempt after which we feel we hэve "done our duty."

We therefore ask the students of the refectory to make a covenent before God in light of Christ's love to fight world hunger. We shall propose at the General Rectory mseting, November 12. 1375 , the following:

Ve as the Social Action Committee ask the Hefectory commuity to recomiend one of the following for action:

1. Sacrifice the Tuesday evening meal of each week. The money saved to be ear-marked to Lutheran World Relief.
2. Sacrifice oart of the Tuesday evening neal, preferably one meatles.s meal each week. The money saved to be ear-marked to Lutheran Vorld Kelief.

We invite the faculty, married and commuting students, interns, and students and faculty of the lasinington Consortium to respond to these proposals in affirmative fashion. Please make checss payable to Love Compells Action--Hunger appeal and send such contributions to the Social Action Comnittee by the end of eaci month that they may be forwarded as a community witness. Thank you.

## S』SQUICETTENIAL MINUTEX

3y 1825, after several years of prodding by S. S. Jchmuciser, sentiment for the establishment of a Lutheran Tieological Seminary had finally frow past the stage of mere discussion and men bezan to take action. In February of that year four local pastors, C. P. Krauth, 3. Kurtz, J. Winter, and F. Ruthrauff, met in Martinsburg, Va., to taice the first steps. ©ne of the first questions which had to be decided was where to locate the proposed semi ary. Dr. J. G. Morris, then a student with the Scinuciser in liew har!set, Va., later wrote: rev. B. Kurtz informed II. Schmucker that Professor HcClelland of Dic'senson College had told him that the trustees of the colle e were anxious that the Lutheran Church siould establish a serinary at Carlisle... ivr. Kurtz proposed another plan which had been laid (by hif) before the conference at liartinsburg... Which was that the seminary should be locater at fagerstown, that the church school house would be offered as a lecture room, that the professor should serve several country churches, and that the 'pastor loci" (Kurtz) sinuld be one of the professors." There was apoarently no mention of Gettysburg at timat time.

The nen at tine liartinsburg conference reached no definite conclusiois but they did set the officiol wheels in motion. finolly, as a sijn of tirir good falth, they took up a collection for the prooosed seminary. Tils first fund-raiser netted the institution the awesome sum of five dollars.
